Why Did Jesus Die? | Matthew 27:45-54

The Passion of the Christ

Pastor Woody Woodward continued our Passion of the Christ series with a powerful message from Matthew 27:45–54 that centers on the question, "Why did Jesus die?" Through dramatic signs and divine proclamations surrounding Jesus' final moments on the cross, we are led to the heart of the gospel: Jesus died so that we might live.

Summary

This passage in Matthew's Gospel presents a series of supernatural and symbolic events that answer the question, "Why did Jesus die?" Darkness covers the land, the veil of the temple is torn from top to bottom, the earth shakes, tombs are opened, and a Roman centurion declares, "Truly this was the Son of God."

Pastor Woody emphasized that these events are not coincidental or merely historical—they are theological signs pointing to God's judgment on sin and His love for humanity. The darkness symbolizes divine judgment, the torn veil represents access to God, the earthquake reveals God's wrath, and the resurrection of saints previews future victory over death. In all these signs, we see that Jesus died in our place, bearing the full weight of sin so we could be reconciled to God.

The centurion's declaration challenges all of us to respond in faith. If even a Roman executioner could recognize Jesus as the Son of God, so can we—regardless of our past. Jesus' death offers life to all who believe.
